Notes on the Presenters

Shannon Fogg is Professor of History & Political Science and Interim Associate Dean for Academic Affairs at Missouri University of Science and Technology in Rolla, MO. Her most recent book is *Stealing Home: Looting, Restitution, Reconstruction, and Jewish Lives in France 1942-1947* (Oxford & New York: Oxford University Press, 2017).

Bertram M. (Bert) Gordon is Professor Emeritus of History at Mills College in Oakland, CA. His most recent book is *War, Tourism: Second World War France from Defeat and Occupation to the Creation of Heritage* (Cornell University Press, 2018). Professor Gordon's first tour de force was the classic work, *Collaborationism in France during the Second World War_*(1980).

Abigail (Abby) Lewis is currently a Visiting Research Fellow at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. In 2018-2019, she held the J. B. and Maurice C. Shapiro Fellowship at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. She will defend her doctoral dissertation, "The Collaborationist Eye: The History and Memory of French Photography under the Nazis," this summer at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Sandy Ott is a cultural anthropologist and Professor of Basque Studies at the University of Nevada, Reno. Her most recent book is *Living with the Enemy: German Occupation, Collaboration and Justice in the Western Pyrenees 1940-1948* (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2017). She is now doing research on the spoliation and restitution of Jewish property in the French Basque Country and Béarn.



Julie Schweitzer is an archivist at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. She specializes in personal papers collections in accordance with institutional practices and procedures and is a resource for scholars interested in the internment camp at Gurs, located just outside the French Basque Country in Béarn.

Scott Soo is an Associate Professor in French History in the School of Humanities at the University of Southampton in the United Kingdom. His most recent work focuses on transnational commemoration at Gurs. The paperback edition of his monograph, *The Routes to Exile: France and the Spanish Civil War Refugees* (Manchester University Press) appeared in 2017.

Julia Torrie is Professor of History at St. Thomas University in Fredericton, Canada. Her co-edited book (with Raffael Scheck & Fabien Théofilakis), *German-Occupied Europe in the Second World War* (Routledge, 2019) includes her chapter on "Women of the Reich: German Military Auxiliaries and the Occupation of Europe." Her monograph, *German Soldiers and the Occupation of France*, 1940-1944 (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press), was published in 2018.

Ed Westermann is Professor of History at Texas A&M-San Antonio. His book, *Hitler's Ostfrieg and the Indian Wars: Comparing Conquest and Genocide* (University of Oklahoma Press) was republished in 2019. His latest book, *Drunk on Genocide: Alcohol, Masculinity, and the Intoxication of Mass Murder in Nazi Germany* (Cornell University Press with the US Holocaust Memorial Museum) is forthcoming in 2021.
